Connie Maxwell Children's Home

Children have a safe, secure, loving environment at Connie Maxwell. It is a home for some children who have been abandoned, abused, or neglected and some who have been placed by loving caregivers going through difficult situations. In addition to the main campus in Greenwood, Connie Maxwell Children's Home provides residential care and family support through satellite locations in Chesterfield, Mauldin, Orangeburg and Florence.

Each year more than 200 children of diverse needs and backgrounds call Connie Maxwell home. Some children stay as little as a few months, others for many years. Some arrive alone, others with siblings. Most are between the ages of six and eighteen. Children who remain through high school graduation receive financial support for college.

History - W.W. Keys formally stated the call for an orphanage to be operated by South Carolina Baptists in a Baptist Courier editorial in 1888. Three years later a site was secured for the new orphanage, now a children's home, and it would be located in Greenwood, primarily through the generosity of Dr. J.C. Maxwell and his wife, Sarah.

The Maxwell's had lost their seven-year-old daughter, Connie, to scarlet fever in 1883. To honor her memory, the Maxwell's gave South Carolina Baptists more than 480 acres and willed their estate to be used in starting this tender ministry for children. The first child was received into care on May 22, 1892. By year's end, 25 other boys and girls had joined the Connie Maxwell family.

- Birthday Parties for the girls. Need a group or individual who likes to plan and implement parties.

also asking our FBA churches to help provide some of the items that are needed. If you would like to help with this, items can be brought to the FBA office by Wednesday, March 19.

Items that are needed include:

- USED book bags or totes (NO NEW bags, they get stolen)
- THIN wash cloths and towels so they will dry quickly
- Travel size shampoo
- Toothbrush
- Toothpaste
- Razors
- Travel size shaving cream
- Men's regular size deodorant
- Men's white socks
- Pop tarts
- Peanut butter crackers (nothing sweet)
- Pop top cans of food (Vienna sausage, ravioli, etc.)

Baptist Global Response (BGR) Bucket Project: Hospice Kits

The BGR Hospice Kit is a five-gallon plastic bucket filled with medical and hygiene supplies that provide a touch of physical and spiritual healing to people in Africa who are dying from HIV/AIDS. Each kit cost about \$100 to put together.

The FBA is going to serve as a collection point for this region. You are encouraged to put a bucket together as an individual, class, or group. Buckets are due at the FBA by June 1, 2014 so they can be transported to Virginia by June 30th.

All kits must include all of the requested items. Purchase new items and, when stated, use only the brands included on the shopping list. **Please refrain from adding ANY other items that are not specifically identified in the instructions. This can cause delays with customs or compromise the safety of our partners living in the field.
